ANNUAL CODE 3 POLICE MEMORIAL BIKE RIDE



To honor fallen officers and raise money for their families, the Westminster Police Department Code 3 Cycling Team completed their annual 630-mile cycling trek from the California Peace Officers' Memorial in Sacramento to Westminster Police Department's Fallen Officer Memorial.

Orange County Sheriff's Department Retired Deputy Ron Dunlap started the ride in 2001 to raise funds to support Orange County officers injured or killed in the line of duty.

In 2012, Westminster Sergeant Bill Drinnin began organizing the event, adding Code 3 Cycling to the cause. Code 3 is the WPD's memorial foundation supporting fallen and injured officers and their families locally and across the country.

Coronavirus Update



Current Status (5/19/21): Yellow Tier

- Aguariums, Libraries, Museums, and Zoos
 - Can open indoors with modifications (no capacity limit)
- Bowling Alleys, Family Entertainment Centers, Ice Rinks, and Indoor Playgrounds (Bounce Centers, Ball Pits, and Laser Tag)
 - Can open indoors with modifications at 50% capacity
 - Capacity can increase to 75% if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination
- Cultural Ceremonies, Places of Worship, and Weddings
 - Can open indoors with modifications. Recommended capacity is 50%.
- Dance Studios, Gyms, Fitness Centers, Yoga Studios, and Climbing Walls
 - Can open indoors with modifications at 50% capacity
 - Gyms and fitness centers can increase capacity to 75% if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination
- Funeral Homes
 - Can remain reopen indoors with modifications at 50% capacity
- Gatherings
 - Outdoor capacity is limited to 100 people
 - Indoor gatherings (strongly discouraged) can take place at 50% capacity or 50 people, whichever is fewer
- Hair Salons, Barbershops, and Personal Care Services (e.g. Nail Salons, Body Waxing, Tattoo Parlors, Piercing Studios, Skin Care and Cosmetology, Massage Services)
 - Can remain reopen indoors with modifications (no capacity limit)
- Live Theater and Live Performances (In-state Attendees Only with Advanced Reservations)
 - Can open outdoors at 67% capacity
 - Max capacity for suites is 25%
 - Can open indoors at 25% capacity or 300 people for venues seating up to 1,500, and 10% capacity or 2,000 people for venues seating 1,501 and above
 - Indoor capacity can increase to 50% if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination

- Marathons, Triathlons, Endurance Events, and Organized Runs/Walks
 - Can open outdoors with modifications at 500 participants per hour and 1,500 total participants
 - Capacity can increase to 3,000 if all participants show proof of negative test or full vaccination
- Movie Theaters
 - Can open indoors with modifications at 50% capacity
 - Capacity can increase to 75% if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination
- Restaurants
 - Can open indoors with modifications at 50% capacity
 - Capacity can increase to 75% if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination
 - Wineries, breweries, and distilleries can open indoors with modifications at 50% capacity or 200 people, whichever is fewer
 - Capacity can increase to 75% if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination
 - Bars can open indoors with modifications at 25% capacity or 100 people, whichever is fewer
 - Capacity can increase to 37.5% if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination
- Retail (e.g. Bookstores, Florists, Grocery, Home and Furnishing Stores, Jewelry, Sporting Goods), Shopping Malls, and Swap Meets
 - Can remain reopen indoors with modifications (no capacity limit)
- Private Events/Meetings, Conferences, and Receptions
 - Tickets or guest list required with assigned seating and no intermingling of multiple private events
 - Can open outdoors at 200 quest capacity
 - Outdoor capacity can increase to 400 if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination
 - Can only open indoors at 200 guest capacity if all guests show proof of negative test or full vaccination







<u>Current revenue projections</u> for FY 2020-21 are in line with budgeted numbers with the exception of sales tax/transaction use tax which is projected to be higher than budgeted.

Sales tax and transaction use tax receipts totals shown in the table above represent four months of receipts from the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA). Projections anticipate FY 2020-21 receipts to be slightly above the actuals received for FY 2019-20. This is still a very early estimate as we have only received the 4 months of receipts for FY 2020-21; however, the increase would be \$2.3 million higher than budgeted.

General Fund expenditures are tracking on budget. Expenditures for the 2nd quarter of FY 2020-21 are \$1.5 million over the prior fiscal year at the same time. This is due to the increase in PERS costs and OCFA contract costs.

At this time, revenue and expenditures are tracking within budget so no budget adjustment was necessary. The next update will be provided after nine months of revenue and expenditures, for the period of July 1, 2020 through March 31, 2021.

Eviction Moratorium EXTENDED

On January 29, 2021 the Governor signed legislation to extend the eviction moratorium and assist tenants and small property owners impacted by COVID-19.

If you are unable to pay your rent due to a coronavirus-related hardship between September 1, 2020 and June 30, 2021, you must also pay at least 25 percent of the rent due to avoid eviction.

Tenants are still responsible for paying unpaid amounts to property owners, but those unpaid amounts cannot be the basis for an eviction, even after the moratorium ends. **Read more here.**

Why is the City updating its Housing Element?

Each city and county in California is required to have a Housing Element and update it at least every eight years. Updating the Housing Element gives the City a clear picture of housing-related issues such as: housing supply and demand, types of housing available within the City, housing affordability, and homelessness. Once the Housing Element is updated, it must be approved by the California Department of Housing and Community Development. Updating our Housing Element will ensure that we meet State requirements, and make Westminster eligible for State grants and other funding sources. 



Schedule a Bulky Item Pickup!

The District provides a monthly bulky item service for the disposal of some appliances and furniture, and will collect two such items from each household approximately every thirty days. For more details, please call (714) 893-3553 at least one week in advance.

Normal items that the District will pick up are: furniture, appliances, patio furniture, large plastic toys, lawn care equipment, television sets, computer monitors, and water heaters. The District does **NOT** pickup: carpet, rugs, glass, mirrors, construction materials, wood, fencing, doors, pallets, and exercise equipment. **PLEASE DO NOT PUT YOUR ITEMS ON THE CURB UNTIL SCHEDULED FOR PICKUP.**

ABC's OF WATER SAFETY



Water safety starts at home. Keeping yourself and others safe in and around the water is as easy as ABC. Follow the safety tips below to make sure you know how to be water safe!



Children and adults drown without a sound. No one should ever swim alone.

A is for ACTIVE ADULT SUPERVISION

- Keep infants and toddlers within an arm's reach.
- No one should ever swim alone, including adults.
- Never rely on water wings, rafts, or other swimming aids in place of U.S. Coast Guard approved life jackets.
- Assign an adult to be a Water Watcher, actively keeping their eyes on the water without ANY distractions.
- If a child or adult is missing, every second counts! Check the water FIRST!

B is for BARRIERS

- Install and maintain proper fencing around the pool and spa to isolate swimming areas.
- Use multiple layers of protection, such as fences, gates, doors, alarms, and safety covers.
- Use self-closing, self-latching gates that open outward and away from the pool.
- Remove items such as chairs or tables that a child could use to climb over a fence.

C is for CLASSES

- Learn to swim by taking lessons.
- Learn first aid and CPR. Always keep a phone nearby to call 9-1-1.
- Teach children that running, jumping, and pushing others on pool decks is dangerous and can cause injuries. Always enter the pool feet first so you know how deep the water is in that area.

Drain Safety

- Keep children away from pool and spa drains to avoid entrapment and entanglement.
- Keep long hair tied back and remove dangling items like jewelry or bathing suit ties.
- Install compliant safety drain covers and automatic shut-off pump systems.
- Know where the pool and spa pump switch is and how to turn it off and on.

Mosquito Repellent Information

When choosing a repellent to prevent mosquito bites, look for the following information on the product label:

Active Ingredient

- DEET
- Picaridin
- IR3535
- Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus (OLE)

Protection Time or Active Ingredient Percentage (%)

Not all products will list the number of hours that the repellent works to prevent mosquito bites. A repellent with a higher percentage of active ingredient will work longer to keep mosquitoes from biting you.

Choose a repellent that will protect you for the amount of time you plan to be outdoors. Please keep in mind, when you are sweating or getting wet, repellents will not last as long.

Who should use repellent and when?

Use repellent when you spend time outdoors in areas with mosquitoes especially during warmer months of the year. EPA-registered repellent is safe for use on:

- Adults
- Pregnant or breastfeeding women
- Children older than 2 months (According to the California Department of Public Health, insect repellent should not be used on babies younger than 2 months old. To protect babies from mosquito bites, dress the child in clothing that covers arms and legs, and cover the child's crib, stroller, or baby carrier with a mosquito net)


